



GLWA Statement on EPA Final Rule for Removing PFAS from Drinking Water

April 10, 2024

The Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) is aware of the Environmental Protection Agency's final rule setting drinking water standards for six per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). GLWA does not have to take specific actions to remove PFAS in that it is not detected in our drinking water and is consistently below the rule's reportable limit in its source (raw) water. Because of the importance of the Great Lakes to Michigan's environment, economy, and public health, GLWA tests its water quality on a more frequent basis than is required by federal or state regulations.
