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**NORMAL WATER PRESSURE RESTORED TO ROCHESTER HILLS,
ORION TOWNSHIP, AUBURN HILLS, LAKE ORION, TROY AND BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP**

- *This morning a disruption at GLWA's North Service Center caused a temporary interruption in water flow to Rochester Hills, Orion Township, Auburn Hills, Lake Orion, a section of Oakland Township, Troy and Bloomfield Township*
- *Normal water pressures were returned to the impacted communities at approximately noon today and the system has been in stable operations since that time*
- *GLWA is investigating the cause of the disruption*
- *The northwest portion of the city of Rochester Hills, as well as a small section of Oakland Township, remains under a boil water advisory*
- *Due to the temporary loss in pressure from GLWA, the city of Pontiac is asking all its residents to avoid all outdoor nonessential water use until further notice*

DETROIT – The Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) experienced a disruption at its North Service Center Pump Station at approximately 8:00 a.m. today, which temporarily impacted water flow to Rochester Hills, Orion Township, Auburn Hills, Lake Orion, a section of Oakland Township, Troy and Bloomfield Township.

Normal operations were returned to the regional water system at approximately noon today and the system has been operating normally since that time.

The northwest portion of the city of Rochester Hills, as well as a small section of Oakland Township, remain under a boil water advisory. Due to the temporary loss in pressure from GLWA earlier in the day, the city of Pontiac is asking its residents to avoid all outdoor nonessential water use until further notice.

The cause of the disruption is being investigated. More information will be shared as it becomes available.
